Obstructive Sleep Apnoea

What changes were we proposing?

The CCGs proposed to set out criteria across Bristol, North Somerset and South Gloucestershire that will mean that patients diagnosed with obstructive sleep apnoea (OSA) are provided with a continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) device only where appropriate and where alternative treatments have failed.

Why were we proposing these changes?

The CCGs proposed these changes as part of a wider review to improve how services are delivered to the local community while at the same time making savings to secure the long term future of healthcare in Bristol, North Somerset and South Gloucestershire. These changes would free up GP time and save an estimated £700,000 per year.

Who was consulted and involved?

Over a four week period between mid-July and mid-August 2017, we involved a range of patients and members of the public in the decision process.

How were they consulted?

We carried out an online survey, which was available for patients and members of the public. The consultation was promoted, with relevant additional information, through the local media, the CCG websites and social media.

What did they say and how have we responded?

We received 43 responses via the CCG website from the public, patients and GP across the three CCG areas.

Overall 60% of respondents agreed with the CCG proposals. Comments were also received about the proposals which are shown overleaf.
