

Weston Worle and Villages

Weston, Worle and Villages is a part of the North Somerset Locality, with a population of approximately 93,642. Despite being the smallest of the BNSSG localities it has high levels of deprivation. North Somerset has the 3rd largest inequality gap in the country with areas falling in the most deprived 1% in England. Evidence has shown that the largest increase in population in North Somerset over the next ten years is set to be in the 75-84 age group (50% vs. 36% in England), followed by the over 85s (46% vs. 42% in England) ([ref](#)).

Pier Health Group is the Primary Care Network (PCN) consisting of 8 GP practices across WWV. Weston has around 1,7000 care home beds in 65 separate facilities.






Top 5 Impactful Conditions by Age in WWV

Impact of Conditions (17yrs and over) by Locality

Impact describes which conditions are likely to have the largest impact on the health service for the population given. Impact is defined as the number of individuals within the relevant population (e.g. ICB, Locality, PCN) identified as having a condition, multiplied by the "general outcome weight" as defined by the Cambridge Multimorbidity Score.

The general outcome weight accurately predicts likelihood of death, unplanned hospital admission and use of GP consultations.

These 'treemaps' display the top 5 conditions, which affect a population. The area correlates to the value of the impact (therefore the larger the rectangle, the larger the impact). Colours are randomly assigned.

Back to home Condition Definitions

- Mental health issues affect all age groups and are a major cause of ill-health among people under 50-years-old. Associated with this, alcohol and substance misuse make up a substantial burden of younger people's poor health.
- Painful conditions affect people substantially through the life course, and while more common in older age groups, are a major cause of ill-health among younger people.
- Later in the life course dementia, diabetes, COPD and atrial fibrillation become more prevalent and have a major impact on the locality population's health.

In response to the Community Mental Health Framework we jointly designed a new model to transform the way Mental Health services are delivered in Weston, Worle and Villages and addressing the gaps in early prevention and provision

Our values are to wrap the team around the person and ensure people get the right support, at the right place, at the right time.

Shared case load meetings launched summer 2022

The WWV IMHT hub launched October 2022 referrals from PCLS

GP Direct referrals launched February 2023 Rollout continues to June 2023.

We have led the way for integrated localised working, designing agreements for organisations to work together, the first DPIA across partners and shared digital systems.


NHSE are closely following our work and have provided support for training, organisational development and evaluation.

A first evaluation is underway and we have now added an independent researcher to evaluate impact and outcomes

Care Home Hub

Weston has the largest concentration of care homes in the SW: 1,700 care home beds across 65 separate homes.

This problem of scale meant residents received inconsistent and inequitable medical care, leading to poorer health outcomes which worsened during the pandemic.

The Care Home Hub was stepped up at pace, tasked with relieving pressure on 999 calls, ambulance conveyances, and avoidable hospital admissions.

Focussing on getting the basics right first, the hub started with 7 homes identified as most "in need" and soon the balance of work moved from a reactive to proactive nature.

Trusted relationships were key; built by a consistent, collaborative approach, supporting the care home staff as well as the residents

Clinical workforce retention, recruitment and job satisfaction has been high, mirroring similar satisfaction from homes and residents.

Ambulance conveyances, call outs and unplanned admissions have reduced significantly and consistently

Phased expansion of the care home hub continues, with 50% coverage of beds by summer 2023




