2. Current waiting time to see a GP	Waiting times to see a GP are dependent on the presenting problem. Practices have triage and care navigation processes in place in order to determine need in terms of same day or routine activity, along with which member of staff is best placed to see, talk or communicate to a patient.

3. Organisations that GPs regularly refer under 18's to	Children's mental health is delivered through the i-thrive model. Initial sign posting is within schools (Mental Health Support Teams in schools and Children and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) colleagues based in schools).

4. Organisations that GPs regularly signpost under 18's to	GPs refer to Avon and Wiltshire Mental Health Partnership Trust (AWP) and serious concerns are referred to CAMHS. Patients can self-refer to Off the Record and Kooth.Com, AWP's two voluntary sub-contractors. Some PCNs also have access to children and young people's social prescribers for lower acuity mental health problems.

	Primary care clinicians have access to education programmes within BNSSG such as Avon GP Education run by the Avon Local Medical Committee, or the education days put on by the Training Hub which may have this as a topic. Individual practices/Primary Care Networks can arrange for their own education sessions. However, we do not hold details for anything attended.

For each GP in Bristol, I would also like to request a copy of their:</li> <li>Safeguarding policy</li> <li>Confidentiality policy</li> <li>Policy statement in relation to capacity, decision making and choice</li> </ul>	Each GP Practice is an individual organisation and will have produced their own policies within national guidelines, appropriate legislation and the requirements of registration as set out by the Care Quality Commission. Each GP Practice must also have a Safeguarding lead GP who will monitor safeguarding concerns and ensure compliance with policies and guidelines, such as safeguarding, confidentiality and patient assessment. All GP's can
