For a period covering the last seven years, of for as long as possible up to that period, could you tell me:		
Clarification received 15/08/23:		
There is a general code reference, but it covers quite a wide range of hernia problems.		
The code is T2110, Repair of a recurrent inguinal hernia. But my particular interest is in cases where the mesh has failed in some way and has to be removed. The terminology to search for would be something like "Revision ongroin surgery" and should include "mesh removal". It may be that this procedure is funded, but not carried out at a local		
NHS hospital, but I would like to know if that was the case, and how many times, as stated in my original request.		
Please also note that my request also seeks information on the types of symptoms and problems that patients were experiencing, and which were deemed sufficient to justify the removal of the hernia mesh. I hope you will be able to find this information. Please let me		
know if there are any further queries. Thanks for you help.
