The Nurses will contact other professionals involved within peoples care provision and have full access to all medical records including community services and GP.
8.	What is the minimum level of training NHS continuing healthcare assessors undertake to understand needs associated with a range of complex long-term conditions?	All senior Nurse assessors have at least 5 years post registration experience within a variety of fields. Once in post they undertake a full induction program which covers the CHC process and the mandatory NHSE CHC training programme. The Nurses have access to a range of specialities within the team and access to other healthcare professionals within the wider system.
